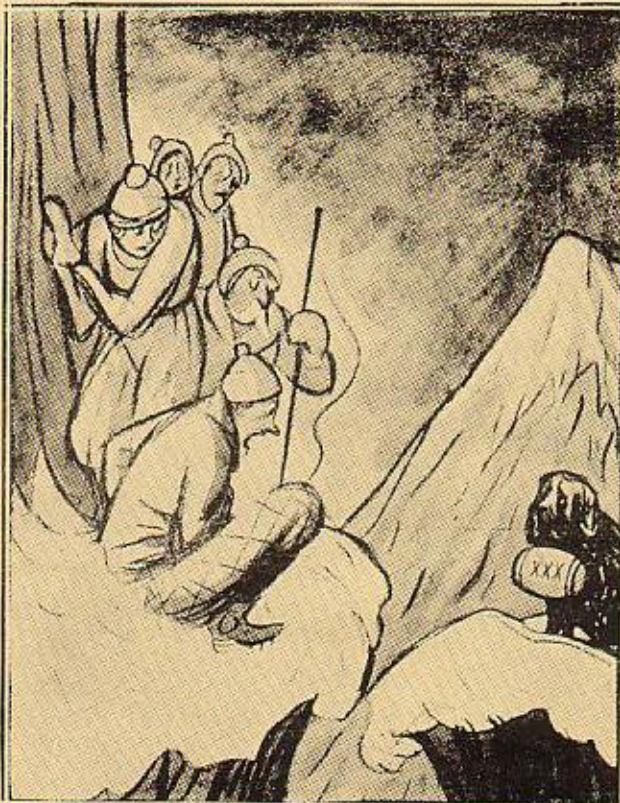

Club Will Try District Plan Of President

Mullray Creates Four
Districts and Appoints
Governor Generals

Since the St. Bernard Club of America covers such a wide territory—the whole of the United States—the Board of Governors has approved a plan to try the experiment of dividing the country into four sections or districts and to place each in charge of one of the governors who will have the title of Governor General and will represent the President of the Club in his or her respective area.

The entire plan is still in embryo and the newly appointed Governor Generals will be given carte blanche commissions to work out in their districts some sort of organizations subordinate to the National Club. The only recommendation made is that

Governor Generals keep in close touch with each other by correspondence and try to build their organizations along somewhat similar lines, so that at the first annual meeting of the Club, a definite set of regulations to cover such district or branch organization can be written into the constitution, provided, of course, that the idea appears to be successful and is formally adopted by the Club.

It is hoped that the four district divisions can become virtually clubs in themselves, hold meetings, perhaps sponsor shows and otherwise perform within their borders the functions of specialty clubs. If the idea works out successfully, and the future growth of the Club warrants it, there is nothing to stop a still further application of this subordinate unit organization plan.

This may sound visionary, but history which is noted for repeating itself is proof that the wild dreams of yesterday become the realities of today. President Mullray, who is the author of the district branch club organization plan, would like to see clubs formed wherever there are four or five members who live near enough together to hold regular meetings.

Acting upon the vote of confidence given his plan by the Board of Governors, President Mullray announces the following territorial divisions and the Governor Generals appointed to supervise them:

EASTERN DISTRICT
(Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Delaware, Rhode Island, New Jersey, New York, and Pennsylvania.)—Mrs. Eleanor J. Dalton, North Stamford, Conn.

SOUTHERN DISTRICT
(Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Louisiana, Tennessee, Kentucky, Mississippi, and District of Columbia.)—Alice H. French, Asheville, N. C.

NORTH CENTRAL DISTRICT
(Michigan, Ohio, Illinois, Indiana, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Missouri, North Dakota, South Dakota, Iowa, Kansas, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Nebraska, and Texas.)—L. C. Urlaub, George, Iowa.

WESTERN DISTRICT
(Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho, Nevada, Utah, Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming, and Montana.)—Robert Nicholson, Inglewood, Calif.
